Blowing off windmills: Cleveland City Council must have gotten over any lingering anger at losing Eaton Corp. as a downtown tenant. The company flirted with moving to the Flats, but ultimately decided to build its headquarters in Beachwood, on Chagrin Highlands land that is owned by Cleveland. Hey, it's better than nothing.

Last week, the council made a concession to Eaton's wishes by adding a covenant to the property deed prohibiting the use of any of the adjacent acreage as a windmill farm. According to Councilman Tony Brancatelli, the company wants a serene corporate headquarters campus uncluttered by windmills, billboards and cell phone towers. Though Councilman Mike Polensek voted no because he's tired of businesses bolting the city, Brancatelli said obliging was an easy call to get the tax benefits of a world headquarters at Chagrin Highlands. But he did note that the request was "a bit ironic."

It wasn't long ago that Eaton CEO Sandy Cutler said the company would begin "finding new ways to generate electricity from the oceans and from wind." Just not next door.
